### Amboy

#### Frances Scholz & Mark von Schlegell September 10–November 21, 2015

**San Francisco, Calif., July 1, 2015**—The CCA Wattis Institute for Contemporary Arts in San Francisco will present the premiere of a new film project by Cologne-based artists Frances Scholz (b. 1962, Washington, DC) and Mark von Schlegell (b. 1967, New York), September 10–November 21. The exhibition is free and open to the public.

Scholz and von Schlegell will premiere their ambitious project Amboy, a horror film. Scholz, a painter and filmmaker, edited, shot, and directed the film in a number of semi-improvised sequences cowritten and coproduced with art theorist and science fiction author von Schlegell, incorporating an expansive cast of actors and collaborators from the worlds of art, film, music, and literature. The film charts the journey of an artist–filmmaker who is led astray from her attempts to make a documentary in Los Angeles by the mysterious history of a deceased male artist named Amboy. Scholz and von Schlegell invited a number of musicians—including Stephen Malkmus, Holy Shit, and Kath Bloom—to provide Amboy's soundtrack, which at times is performed on camera, in proximity to the film's narrative action. Actors in Amboy include Paul Giamatti, Eleanor Antin, Penny Arcade, Chris Kraus, Andrea Fraser, Marjorie Perloff, and Colm Tóibín.

Amboy interlaces passages of genuine documentary (for instance, segments feature Lydia van Vogt, widow of the celebrated sci-fi writer A.E. van Vogt) with carefully scripted and acted sequences that serve the loose narrative arc of the film. Amboy's storyline is expressed with a disorienting array of cinematic strategies taken from feature films, documentaries, B movies, and home video¬ style recordings. The conflation of these approaches takes place in an exhibition environment: one that includes photographic prints and readymade objects taken from the actual location of Amboy, a ghost town in the Mojave desert that serves as the central location of the film. Amboy is both an allegorical figure and a geographical site: a vector by which the film proceeds, interrupts itself, transmits its story, and unspools its own making in the same filmic time and space. Throughout the footage in Amboy, a sense of documentary remains in even the most fantastical scenes (or, as Scholz puts it, "reality fucks with fiction"), and the viewer is left with a document of the film's process as well as the fabulations and drama of its plot.

Frances Scholz and Mark von Schlegell last collaborated on the episodic film Starlite, which was commissioned by the artist Cosima von Bonin as a component of her exhibition tour throughout Europe between 2011 and 2012. Startlite was, among others, screened at Chisenhale Gallery, London (2011); Museum Ludwig, Cologne (2012); and MOCA, Los Angeles (2013).

Frances Scholz lives and works in Cologne. Recent exhibitions include 20 Years, Halle für Kunst, Lüneburg, (2015); China City, Kölnischer Kunstverein, Cologne (2012); Dystopia, CAPC Musée d'Art Contemporain de Bordeaux (2011); and Rom Report, Badischer Kunstverein, Karlsruhe (2008). Scholz is professor of painting at the Academy of Fine Arts in Braunschweig.

Mark von Schlegell's stories and essays appear regularly in underground newspapers, zines, art books, and periodicals the world over. Venusia, his first novel, was honor-listed for the 2007 James M. Tiptree Jr. Prize in science fiction. He is currently on the faculty at Städelschule, Frankfurt, where he directed a student production of Hamlet (2011), an homage to Jack Smith at Portikus.
